Purpose

This Child Safety Strategy provides context to The Federation's commitment to child safety and promoting and protecting the interests and safety of children. This document identifies current child safety policies and practices and outlines the ways in which The Federation will work in collaboration to improve child safety. It will respond to the Ministerial Order 870 by strengthening the capacity across The Federation.

About the Wodonga Federation of Government Schools

Wodonga Federation of Government Schools (The Federation) is a strategic collaboration between eight government member schools within the Local Government Area of Wodonga. It provides a variety of learning and developmental pathways to 60% of Wodonga's school aged children and young people. It employees over 350 teachers and 190 non-teaching staff and contributes over \$53 million to the local economy each year.

Established in July 2016, the Federation member schools include five primary schools, one middle years college, one senior secondary college and a special school. Each member school shares a commitment to the principles of education as outlined in the Education and Training Reform Act 2006, in particular, the principle of universal access to education for all children and young people.

The Federation is focussed on optimising the learning and developmental outcomes of all children and young people in Wodonga. Together The Federation ensures that there is a variety of learning and developmental pathways for all children and young people in Wodonga.

The Federation's Child Safety Philosophy

The Federation has a strong commitment to providing a child safe learning environment where the interests and safety of all children is promoted and protected. The Federation has a zero tolerance of child abuse.

As part of the Federation Child Safety Philosophy, member schools adhere to the Child Safety Standards. This forms the basis for all strategies, policies, procedures and practices, allowing staff, volunteers and contractors to promote children's learning and wellbeing. The Federation recognises every child's fundamental right to learning in a safe environment and participation in decision making. Decision that the Federation makes are therefore guided by the children's safety needs and interests.

The Federation promotes an inclusive environment for all children, parents and staff. It believes every child, parent and staff member has the right to be valued and treated with respect and dignity. The Federation does not tolerate any discriminatory practices. It strives to promote cultural safety, participation and empowerment of Aboriginal children and their families and culturally and/ or linguistically diverse children and families. The Federation welcomes children with disabilities and their families and their participation.

Staff within The Federation are trained in preventing and responding to child safety. All staff undergo 'Working with Children Checks' and sign a Child Safety Code of Conduct.

The Federation's Child Safety Objectives

- 1. To embed a culture of child safety within The Federation.
- 2. To prevent child abuse occurring within The Federation.
- 3. To ensure that all suspected abuse is responded to appropriately within the Federation.
- **4.** To ensure that all children, parents, staff, volunteers and contractors are given appropriate support regarding child safety within The Federation.
- 5. To value and empower children to participate in decisions which affect their lives.

The Federation's role in Child Safety

• Leadership and facilitation - The Federation develops strategic collaborations to improve child safety by providing support, co-ordinating efforts and bring stakeholders together.


• Information provider – The Federation shares policies, practices, support material, research and data with our schools and community.

Context

Context:

The following initiatives inform and support the work of this strategy.

International Context

United Convention on the Rights of the Child (CROC)

The CROC outlines the civil, political, economic, social, health and cultural rights of children. Australia is a signatory to the CROC. Article 19 of the CROC recognises that all appropriate measures must be taken to protect children from all forms of physical and/or mental harm. The CROC underpins this strategy.

State Context

Victorian Charter of Human Rights (the Charter)

The Charter outlines the basic rights, freedoms and responsibilities of all Victorians. Under the charter all government authorise must act consistently with the rights in the charter. This includes being safe from violence and abuse.

National Context

National Framework for Protecting Australia's Children 2009-2020 (the National Framework)

The National Framework provides a long-term approach to child safety and wellbeing. The National Framework has six supporting outcomes:

- children live in safe and supportive families and communities
- children and families access adequate support to promote safety and intervene early
- risk factors for child abuse and neglect are addressed children who have been abused or neglected receive the support and care they need for their safety and wellbeing
- Indigenous children are supported and safe in their families and communities

The Betrayal of Trust report

In April 2012, the Victorian Government initiated an inquiry into the handling of child abuse allegations within religious and other non-government organisations. The committee handed their final report, The Betrayal of Trust to the Victorian Parliament in November 2013. The final report made a number of recommendations that the Victorian Government have enacted. These include:

- Criminal law reform offences relating to grooming, failure to protect and failure to disclose.
- Creating child safe organisations –
- compulsory child safe standards and a reportable conduct scheme.
- Civil law reform removal of the time limit on legal action.

 child sexual abuse and exploitation is prevented and survivors receive adequate support.

The Royal Commission into Institutional Response to Child Sexual Abuse (Royal Commission)

The Royal Commission has investigated institutional responses to allegations and incidents of child sexual abuse and related matters. The Royal Commission's research and recommendations on best practice aims to provide guidance on strategies to prevention institutional sexual abuse and how to respond.

Child Safe Standards

Victoria's Compulsory Child Safe Standards

In response to the recommendations of the Victorian Parliamentary Inquiry into Handling of Child Abuse by Religious and other Non-Government Organisations the Minister of Education release Ministerial Order No. 870 – Child Safe Standards – Managing the Risk of Child Abuse in Schools.

To meet the requirements of the Order schools must implement the minimum child safety standards:

- Standard 1: Strategies to Embed an Organisational Culture of Child Safety
- Standard 2: A Child Safe Policy or Statement of Commitment to Child Safety
- Standard 3: A child safety code of conduct
- Standard 4: School staff selection, supervision and management practices for a child-safe environment
- Standard 5: Procedures for responding to and reporting allegations of suspected child abuse.
- Standard 6: Strategies to identify and reduce or remove risks of child abuse
- Standard 7: Strategies to promote child empowerment and participation

In implementing the child safety standards schools must comply with the following principle as part of each standard:

 promoting the cultural safety, participation and empowerment of Aboriginal children, children from culturally and/or linguistically diverse backgrounds and those with a disability.

Standard 1: Strategies to Embed an Organisational Culture of Child Safety

Ministerial Order requirements

The school governing authority must: Develop strategies to embed a culture of child safety at the school;

- Allocate roles and responsibilities for achieving the strategies;
- Inform the school community about the strategies, and allocated roles and responsibilities;
- Put the strategies into practice, and inform the school community about these practices; and
- Periodically review the effectiveness of the strategies put into practices and, if considered appropriate, revise those strategies.

Existing Strategies to meet the requirements of the Ministerial Order:

- Annually Federation Member School Councillors are inducted into the Child Safe Standards • (School Council Presentation)
- Each Member School Council has Child Safe Standards as a standing agenda item and annually Child Safe Implementation Plan)
- Child Safe Roles and Responsibilies communicated to all staff, leadership and school councillors at the beginning of the year
- Child Safe Communication Plan

Standard 2: A Child Safe Policy or Statement of Commitment to Child Safety

Ministerial Order requirements:

The school governing authority must ensure that the school has a child safety policy or statement of commitment to child safety that details:

- The values and principles that will guide the school in developing policies and procedures to create and maintain a child safe school environment; and
- The actions the school proposes to take to:
 - Demonstrate its commitment to child safety and monitor the school's adherence to its child safety or statement of commitment;
 - Support, encourage and enable school staff, parents, and children to understand, identify, dicuss and report child safety matters; and
 - support or assist children who disclose child abuse, or are other linked to suspected child abuse.

The school governing authority must inform the school community about the policy or statement, and make the policy or statement publicly available.

Standard 3: A child safety Code of Conduct

Ministerial Order requirements:

The school governing authority must develop, endorse, and make publicly available a code of conduct that:

- Has the objective of promoting child safety in the school environment;
- Sets standards about ways in the school staff are expected to behave with children;
- Takes into account the interests of school staff (including other professional or occupational codes
 of conduct that regulate particular school staff), and the needs of all children; and
- Is consistent with the school's child safety strategies, policies and procedures as revised from time to time.

Existing Strategies to meet the requirements of the Ministerial Order:

- Wodonga Federation of Government Schools Child Safety Code of Conduct (The Code of Conduct) has been approved by each member school council.
- A paper copy is available upon request.
- The Code of Conduct is publicly available on The Federation's website.
- Member school websites
- The Federation has common procedures for individual school staff, unaccompanied visitors, volunteers and contractors accepting the Code of Conduct and recording acceptance.
- All staff have access to the Child Safe Policy and sign the Code of Conduct annually.
- Visitors, contractors and service provider all sign the Code of Conduct annually. This is managed through our online visitor management system – Passtab.

Standard 4: School staff selection, supervision and management practices for a child-safe environment

Ministerial Order requirements:

- Subject to the requirements of the ETR Act, the school governing authority must ensure that the school implements practices for a child-safe environment in accordance with this clause.
- Each job or category of jobs for school staff that involves child-connected work must have a clear statement that sets out:
 - The job's requirements, duties and responsibilities regarding child safety, and
 - The job occupant's essential or relevant qualifications, experience and attributes in relation to child safety.
- All applicants for jobs that involve child-connected work for the school must be informed about the school's child safety practices (including the code of conduct)
- In accordance with any applicable legal requirement or school policy, the school must make
 reasonable efforts to gather, verify and record the following information about a person whom it
 proposes to engage to perform child-connected work:
 - Working with Children Check status, or similar check;
 - Proof of personal identify and any professional or other qualifications;
 - The person's history of work involving children; and
 - References that address the person's suitability for the job and working with children.
- The school need not comply with the requirements in clause 10(4) if it has already made reasonable efforts to gather, verify and record the information set out in clauses 10(4)(a) to 10(4) (d) about a particular individual within the previous 12 months.
- The school must ensure that appropriate supervision or support arrangements are in place relation to: The induction of new school staff into the school's policies, codes, practices, and procedures governing child safety and child connected work; and
 - Monitoring and assessing a job occupant's continuing suitability for child-connected work.
- The school must implement practices that enable the school governing authority to be satisfied that people engaged in child-connected work perform appropriately in relation to child safety.

Existing Strategies to meet the requirements of the Ministerial Order:

- All new position descriptions include a child safe statement.
- All existing positions have be notified in writing their child safety responsibilities.
- A checklist has been developed for all recruitment processes.

Standard 5: Procedures for responding to and reporting allegations of suspected child abuse

Ministerial Order requirements:

The school governing authority must have a clear procedures or set of procedures for responding to allegations of suspected child abuse in accordance with this clause and other legal obligations.

- The school governing authority must ensure that the procedures is: Sensitive to the diversity characteristic of the school community; Made publicly available; and
 - Accessible to children, school, and the wider community.
- The procedures must:
 - Cover all forms of 'child abuse' as defined in the ETR Act;
 - Apply to allegations or disclosures of child abuse made by or in relation to a child, school staff, visitors, or other persons while connected to a school environment;
- Identify the positions of person or people who are responsible for:
 - Promptly managing the school's response to an allegation or disclosure of child abuse, and ensuring that the allegation or disclosure is taken seriously;
 - Responding appropriately to a child who makes or is effected by an allegation of child abuse;
 - Monitoring overall school compliance with this procedure; and Managing an alternative procedure for responding to an allegation or disclosure if the person allocated responsibility under clause 11(3)(c)(i) cannot perform his or her role;
- Including a statement that fulfilling the roles and responsibilities contained in the procedure does not displace or discharge any other obligations that arise if person reasonably believes that a child is at risk of child abuse;
 Clearly describe the actions the school will take to respond to an allegation of child abuse, including actions to:

 Inform appropriate authorities about the allegation (including but not limited to mandatory reporting);
 Protect any child connected to the alleged child abuse until the allegation is resolved; and Make, secure, and retain records of the allegation of child abuse and the school's response to it.
- The procedure must not:
 - Prohibit or discourage school staff from reporting an allegation of child abuse to a person external to the school;
 - State or imply that it is the victim's responsibility to inform the police or other authorises of the allegation;
 - Require staff to make a judgement about the truth of the allegation of child abuse; or Prohibit staff from making records in relation to an allegation or disclosure of child abuse.

Standard 6: Strategies to identify and reduce or remove risks of child abuse

Ministerial Order requirements:

The school governing authority must develop and implement risk management strategies regarding child safety in school environment.

- The school's risk management strategies regarding child safety must identify and mitigate the risk(s) of child abuse in school environments by taking into account the nature of each school environment, the activities expected to be conducted in that environment (including the provision of services by contractors), and the characteristics and needs of all children expected to be present in that environment.
- If the school governing authority identifies risks of child abuse occurring in one or more school
 environments the authority must make a record of those risks and specific the action(s) the
 school will take to reduce or remove the risks (risk controls).
- As part of its risk management strategy and practices, the school governing authority must monitor and evaluate the effectiveness of the implementation of its risk controls.
- At least annually, the school governing authority must ensure that appropriate guidance and training is provided to the individual members of the school governing authority and school staff about:
 - Individual and collective obligations and responsibilities for managing the risk of child abuse;
 - Child abuse risks in the school environment; and
 - The school's current child safety standards.

Standard 7: Strategies to promote child empowerment and participation

Ministerial Order requirements:

- The school governing authority must develop strategies to deliver appropriate education about:
 - Standards of behaviour for students attending the school;
 - Healthy and respectful relationships (including sexuality);
 - Resilience;
 - Child abuse awareness and prevention
- The school governing authority must promote the child safety standards required by this Order in ways that are readily accessible, easy to understand, and user-friendly to children.

- Member school have a Student Engagement Policy
- All member schools are implementing Respectful Relationships A whole School Approach as well as the Resilience, Rights and Respectful Relationships Curriculum. Staff from each school attend curriculum training provide by Melbourne University.

- Member schools design the PROTECT posters around their school.
- Community Information night My Underpants Rule
- Community Information night Y-Safe
